



between LUTS and both ED and EjD [2]. It appears that the pathophysiological mechanisms of LUTS and the related prostatic enlargement of BPH, as well as certain treatments for this condition, may have an impact on both the erection and ejaculation components of the sexual response [3,4]. Finasteride is the first 5alpha-reductase inhibitor that received clinical approval for the treatment of human BPH and androgenetic alopecia (male pattern hair loss) [5]. A large randomized trial has also shown that finasteride
